## Workshop Objectives

At the completion of this workshop students will:

- Be able to construct a research statement and distinguish appropriate keywords to conduct an information search.
- Be able to apply keywords and search techniques to the library's search systems to locate library materials available through the library.
- Be able to evaluate resources accessed through the library's One Search system and databases.

## How do I choose a topic?

Think about what interests you most or something you always wanted to find out about.

Use a resource to help you find a topic and gather some background information. Perhaps reading a newspaper will give you an idea. Next, I'll show you some library databases that can help you locate topics on current events, controversial issues, or social issues.

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# Developing a Manageable Topic

When starting a research project, people often start with a broad, general topic. From there, it's important to narrow it down to something manageable for the assignment requirements.

When trying to narrow down your topic, it may help to think of the 5 Ws:

- 1. Who? Does your topic relate to a specific population, age group, ethnic group, etc?
- 2. When? Does your topic involve a certain time period?
- **3. Where?** Is your topic specific to a certain geographic area, country, city, county etc?
- 4. What? What aspect of your topic do you want to look at? Legal issues, social issues, educational issues, etc?
- **5. Why?** Why is your topic important or what are some of the concerns surrounding your topic? Pollution, economic impact, etc?

## Keywords: Why?

- Why are keywords important? Library databases work more efficiently when keywords are used to search for information.
- Once you have identified the primary keywords in your topic, you can use those to search for books, as well as articles in journals, magazines, newspapers, etc.
- Next are some things to keep in mind while you're brainstorming keywords...

## **Examples of Research Questions** and **Keywords**

- Video games contribute to childhood obesity
- Social networking sites should be liable for personal privacy
- Charter schools are more effective than public schools

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## How to Develop Additional Keywords

Main keywords: These are the main search terms from your research question or thesis statement.

Broader terms: Broader topics can be helpful when searching for books related to your topic.

Narrower terms: You might find it helpful to focus on more specific aspects of a broad topic.

Related terms: These are often people, places, issues, ideas or events related to the topic.

**Synonyms**: Using synonyms can be helpful if you aren't finding relevant search results.

Variant forms: Often these are different parts of speech or singular/plural forms of a word.

Make a list of keywords related to your topic...

## Examples of Additional Keywords

Primary Keywords	Synonym 1	Synonym 2	Synonym 3
Video Games	Computer games	Virtual Games	Internet Games
Childhood	Youth	Adolescents	Children
Obesity	Overweight	Unhealthy	Juvenile Diabetes

We can now use some of those keywords to look for books and articles available through the library.

Using your Keywords

When starting your search, you can start with your broad topic and then add in your additional keywords to get more specific results.

## Search Techniques

#### Boolean Operators

- **AND:** Connecting search terms using AND will give you FEWER results. It's good for narrowing down your search results. Ex: children and technology
- **OR:** Connecting search terms using OR will give you MORE results. It's good for searching for similar terms. Ex: (covid-19 or coronavirus)
- **Phrase searching**: To search multiple terms as a phrase, place the search terms in quotes. Ex: "work from home"

### One Search


The Library's **One Search** system allows you to search for books and electronic resources all in one place!

## How to Add Additional Keywords


Once you've done a search on video games, click on the Advanced Search button on the right.




## Add your additional keywords\*

- Once you click Search, the next page will show you a list of results that match your search terms.
- There are several ways you can interact with the search results.

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## Types of Sources

When using **One Search**, your search results will have a variety of source types:

- Reference/Background Sources
- Books (textbooks, fiction, non-fiction)
- Newspaper Articles
- Magazine Articles
- Scholarly/Peer Reviewed Articles
- Videos

# Identifying Source Types

- Once you have a list of results, it's important to be able to identify the types of sources you're seeing.
- One Search indicates if the source is a book, article, video, etc.
- Once you locate a source you'd like to read/view, click on the title or the 'Available Online' link.




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#### Accessing Electronic Resources

- Sometimes articles are available from multiple library databases.
- To access the article, you'll need to log in with your RCCD Email...

# How do I find articles?


In addition to using One Search to find articles, you can search specific databases.

## Choosing a Database

- This is the list of all the databases the library subscribes to.
- You can read the description and choose the database that's best for your class and topic.
- The most common database to start with is Academic Search Complete.

Academic Search Complete is a multi-subject database that is very useful for a variety of topics.




## Once you've logged in, you'll see the search screen.


